The Starry Giraffe by Andy Bergmann At first glance this book does not seem to relate to the Holiday Season, but the story celebrates something all the holidays share.

Ask the children: What did you think of the giraffe? How do you feel when someone gives you a gift? How do you feel when **you** give a gift to someone?

The holidays have traditionally been celebrated by people singing special songs together. I performed "Jingle Bells" with the help of a chorus of puppets with bells and shakers, (with the magic of video!).

I retold "The Starry Giraffe" with puppets. When the children act out or see a story acted out, they can better understand the story, and identify with the characters.

I demonstrated another way to retell "The Starry Giraffe", a method that lets the children participate and that could be used to retell other simple stories. I emailed patterns for the characters in the story for the children to color and cut out.

Make a liquid-free snowglobe!



1. Trace around a 7" clear plastic plate on a piece of white construction paper and cut out. 2. Let children make a winter scene on the paper circle , including falling snowflakes, using crayons. 3. Let children paint over the entire picture with blue watercolor paint. When dry, add 2 TBSP granulated tapioca.4. Glue plastic plate to edge of winter scene. Let dry in flat position. *NOTE: For young children, you can let them make a snowman by gluing precut shapes, together, on a blue construction paper circle.*
