- TALKHave you heard of the Amazon? (Not the store that sends boxes the Rainforest and
the River!) What can you tell me about the rainforest? Have you ever seen the movies,
"The Jungle Book" or "Madagascar"? Would you like to go to a rainforest?
- **SING "The Animal Boogie".** We listened to the song on **YouTube** while looking at the book, and following the dance moves.
- PLAY The children met Slo-mo, the sloth, and other rainforest animals (puppets), and learned fascinating facts about each one.
- WRITE The children worked on a group picture of a rainforest, coloring the trees with markers, then coloring pictures of rainforest animals and adding them to the scene using glue sticks.
- **STEM** We used a tape measure to see how much rain the rainforests get in a year, and compared them to Lancaster's annual rainfall. We also used the tape measure to see how big some of the rainforest animals are.

A Fall STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, ART, and Math) project



- 1. Take the children on a leaf-collecting trip. (For older children you could then identify the leaves using a guide book or the internet.) Also ask them to collect some twigs to use as the trunks for the trees they will make.
- 2. Glue the twigs to a piece of construction paper using tacky glue, then let the children glue the leaves to the top of the trunks with glue sticks.

3. Crumple or tear leftover leaves into little pieces and glue them to the bottom of the picture, under the trunk. Let dry. Mount them on a piece of cardboard or a larger piece of construction paper to add a frame.

Rainforests don't have Autumn, but we do!



Use eye-droppers to add watercolors to coffee filters. Then add a tree silhouette (or let the children make the tree branches with black strips).



Let children paint a large leaf with many colors. Press the leaf onto a paper, and—instant tree!
